

Richard Willey Memorial Faculty Development Fund Award

Dr. Richard L. Willey was a native of Walnut Grove, Missouri. He earned a B.S. degree at Southwest Missouri State University, an M.S. degree at Drury College of Missouri, and an Ed.D. degree at the University of Missouri.

For eleven years, Dr. Willey served as a teacher and a principal in the Missouri secondary schools. He also served on the faculties of the University of Missouri and Southwest Missouri State University. For thirteen years, he was the Dean of the College of Education at Idaho State University, Pocatello, Idaho. He has served as chairman of the Idaho Association for Higher Education, the state liaison representative of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and was a member of the Pocatello Chamber of Commerce, the Governor's Committee for Human Resources, the Federation of Rocky Mountain States, and the Idaho Council for Economic Development.

In his four-year tenure at ISU, Dr. Willey was endeared by his academic colleagues, students, alumni, other professional educators, and the citizens of the local community.

Application: Complete a letter of application that includes a description of the citizenship of service completed during the 2011 calendar year, noting outcomes of expanding service to individuals, the department, the College, its students, and/or the profession and evidence of contribution, leadership, and collaboration with others to accomplish the activity. Up to 10 pages of support materials may accompany the application that includes letters of support, notes of appreciation for the service, etc.

Due Date: Applications are to be submitted to Shelia Weir in the dean's office by **February 15, 2012**. A committee appointed by the dean will review applications and make a recommendation for the award to the Dean. Announcement and presentation of the award will be made at the Honor's Day Program on April 25, 2012.
